Insyriated is a gripping Syrian war drama, centred on Oum, a mother of three who is trapped inside her flat in a city under siege. Turning the flat into a safe harbour for her family and neighbours, she tries desperately to protect them from the savagery of the battles outside, remaining steadfast as the bombs, snipers and the horrors of war encroach inevitably.

This is a tautly-constructed, intensely claustrophobic drama about what must be done to survive the senseless violence of war, not just physically, but morally and emotionally.

This culminated in the murder of three young African American men and the brutal beating of several other men and women. Parking


Our regular car park has been re-named the Beacon Car Park and is now open for our use and is free of charge during the screenings.

Struggling to rebuild her life after the Second World War, Maria Braun waits for her husband Hermann, meeting every train, until her brother-inlaw returns from a Russian POW camp to confirm his death. Now decidedly alone, Maria takes her fate into her own hands, using her beauty, ambition and intelligence to prosper in Germany's "economic miracle" of the 1950s.

With a sublime performance from Hanna Schygulla at its heart, Rainer Werner Fassbinder's masterpiece is a nuanced insight into Germany's post-war reconstruction and the compromises of his parents' generation.

Dr. Ulrike Sieglohr, author of the critical star study of Hanna SCHYGULLA, will introduce the film and lead a Q&A.

Defiantly seeking an escape from her circumstances, Maud applies for the position of live-in housekeeper to local fish peddler, Everett, with whom an unlikely romance unfolds.

Hawkins gives an extraordinary performance as Maud, whose inauspicious artistic career would ultimately find international fame.

French cinema icon Jean-Pierre Léaud tackles the role of one of the greatest French kings, Louis XIV, bringing a strong physical presence to a portrayal of the final months of the king's life. Albert Serra's film peels back the layers of mortality, presenting Louis supine in wigs and powder in his bed chamber, his necrotic leg a corporeal portent of impending death.

The Death of Louis XIV is a profound and understated portrait of the end of life, with a powerful performance from Léaud that is as compelling as his début in Francois Truffaut's The 400 Blows six decades ago.

Gradually paying off his debt to Doc, the all seeing crime boss, Baby is the wheel man on a series of armed robberies and high octane getaways with little to lose. Until he meets Debora at

his favourite cafe and new avenues open up for him.

However, upon meeting his enigmatic cousin following her return to England his preconceptions are soon countered by her beguiling charms.

England Is Mine is the evocative and (and surprisingly funny) portrait of the formative years of Steven Patrick Morrissey, who desperately wants to write and sing without getting any further than the NME letters page. When punk hits 1970s Manchester, and armed with youthful arrogance, Steven is inspired to find his place in the musical world.

Jack Lowden plays Morrissey in an unauthorised portrait that explores the influences, ambition and creativity that would go on to inform The Smiths' singular musical expression.

Casey Affleck and Rooney Mara play a young, unnamed couple who move into an old Texas ranch, in David Lowery's haunting tale that is like no other. After a road accident, Affleck's spectral form, a white-sheeted ghost, returns to his suburban home, untethered from time, and forced to watch passively as the woman he loves slowly slips away from him.

Lowery directs a poetic meditation on love, grief and the human need for connection, which lingers long after the credits have rolled.
