An immersive, unsettling melodrama from Gaspar Noé seen through the eyes of a French drug dealer living in Tokyo with his stripper sister, which becomes more ambitious and hallucinatory as Oscar keeps their pact to look out for each other even after his death.

least controversial work, overt sexual scenes, nudity and drug taking are included.

WHITE MATERIAL (15)

A stark, haunting drama from Claire Denis which explores social-political turmoil and ensuing civil and racial conflicts; as a deluded white plantation owner (Isabelle Huppert) attempts to save the family coffee business amidst a violent military coup in an unnamed West African country. 'Claire Denis's powerful, disturbing film about modern Africa is her best since Beau Travail' (Peter Bradshaw, 'The Guardian')

TAMARA DREWE (15)

Stephen Frears adapts Posy Simmonds' Guardian comic strip, based on Thomas Hardy's *Far From The Madding Crowd*; exposing the vanities, absurdities and infidelities lurking in a rural Dorset village, in an entertaining boisterous comedy. Gemma Arterton heads a strong British ensemble as the glamorous journalist who ruffles the feathers of the villagers.

CERTIFIED COPY (12A)

An elegant indefinite love story from Abbas Kiarostami with an award winning performance from Juliette Binoche, in which an unnamed woman is drawn to a writer she meets at a literary talk in Tuscany. When taken to be man and wife they play along, whereupon real emotions begin to surface and their interactions take on double meanings.

MY SON, MY SON, WHAT HAVE YE DONE? (15)

A deadpan black comedy as idiosyncratic as only a film directed by Werner Herzog and produced by David Lynch could be. The strange tale unfolds as a detective, aided by his suspect's girlfriend and an amateur theatre director, gradually pieces together the events that led to the police besieging the house of Brad McCullum.

THE RUNAWAYS (15)

Kristen Bell and Dakota Fanning lead in a biopic of the pioneering girl group founded by Joan Jett, adapted from the lead singer Cherie Currie's book *Neon Angel*. The Runaways captures the spirit and sleaze of 70s rock and roll, charting the band's rise and fall, the scandals and their manipulation by producer Kim Fowley.

BLUE BEARD (15)

Catherine Breillat's adaptation of Charles Perrault's sinister 17th century wife-slaying fairytale, adopting a minimalist approach and themes of sisterly rivalry and social-religious division. 'This adaptation is surprisingly free of violence: Breillat has produced a witty, graceful and unusually tender reading of the fairytale.' (Sukhdev Sandhu, 'The Telegraph')

METROPOLIS (PG)

The most complete version of Fritz Lang's futurist masterpiece seen since its release in 1927, with a new orchestral recording of the original score. Lang combines imagination and technological vision with melodrama as the workers' leader Maria longs for a mediator to bring peace to a dystopian city-state built and maintained by subterranean slave labour.

MADE IN DAGENHAM (15)

A dramatisation of the 1968 strike by women at Ford's Dagenham plant incensed that their working conditions, already impoverished in relation to their male colleagues, are to be diminished further by re-classification as 'unskilled workers'. Sally Hawkins, Rosamund Pike and Bob Hoskins lead a stellar cast in a light hearted drama from Calendar Girls director Nigel Cole.

BAARIA (15)

Cinema Paradiso director Giuseppe Tornatore returns to his native Sicily with a humorous yet heartbreaking family saga, recounting Peppino Torrenuova's life from his 30s childhood to forbidden romance and marriage in later life, set against a backdrop of Italian political upheaval.

WINTER'S BONE (15)

An evocative, powerfully observed drama set in the desolate Ozark mountains, centred on an outstanding performance by Jennifer Lawrence as Ree Dolly, a teenage girl who must challenge her outlaw family's code of honour to find her wayward father whose bail jumping threatens the family with destitution. 'A vivid reworking of Daniel Woodrell's novel that brings the book's conflicted heroine to searing life in a piece of unhurried filmmaking too rarely seen these days.' (Philip Wilding, 'Empire')

THE WILDEST DREAM (PG)

A documentary about mountaineer George Mallory's fatal 1924 attempt to become the first to reach Everest's summit, narrated by Liam Neeson with the letters exchanged by Mallory's and his wife voiced by Ralph Fiennes and Natasha Richardson. Mallory's ascent is recreated by Conrad Anker, the man who in 1999 discovered Mallory's body frozen high in Everest's 'dead zone', presenting a real sense of the terrain's sheer overwhelming inhospitability.

THE MAID (15)

A psychological thriller, and also a poignant human drama with an astonishingly complex lead performance by Catalina Saavedra as Raquel, the long-suffering household maid of an affluent Santiago family. Sebastián Silva's gripping film shifts in tone when Raquel's territory is threatened with her well-meaning employer's hiring of a second maid to aid her in duties. 'It's a superbly nuanced and thoughtful picture, with an outstanding performance by Saavedra at its heart.' (Anthony Quinn, 'The Independent')

I'M STILL HERE (15)

Casey Affleck's audacious mockumentary charting Joaquin Phoenix's year long sabbatical in which he abandoned his 'self-imposed prison of characterisation' to be the freestyle rapper he was always meant to be. In the grand tradition of cinematic fakes, Affleck presents an entertaining look at Hollywood celebrity that is at times, hilarious, revealing and shocking.

MR NICE (18)

A vivid biopic of Howard Marks, in which Rhys Ifans plays Marks, an Oxford graduate and teacher who turned to drug smuggling to impress his future wife Judy. Bernard Rose's biopic follows Marks as his naivete and irresponsibility lead to a series of stranger-than-fiction episodes, becoming Britain's most-wanted man along the way, in a life lived with genuine disregard to consequences.

POLICE, ADJECTIVE (12A)

As the title suggests, Police, Adjective is a police procedural drama whose pivotal scenes revolve around semantic discussion of grammar. 12:08 East of Bucharest director, Corneliu Porumboiu's film concerns the moral dilemma of Cristi, a Bucharest policeman who becomes increasingly conflicted with the efficacy of his investigation into a schoolboy's drug dealing.
